Addendum for those interested in becoming Catholic:

- 1. You will need a practicing Catholic to be your sponsor. That person should attend the classes with you, if at all possible. If you do not have someone in mind, we can find a sponsor for you.
- 2. If you were baptized in another faith, either as a child or adult, we will need a copy of the certificate which was issued at your baptism or a new one. This can be obtained by contacting the church of your baptism and asking them for a copy of your baptismal certificate or a letter verifying that you had been baptized. This should include your name, the date of your birth, the names of your parents and godparents, the date of your baptism and the name of the minister who baptized you.
- 3. When appropriate, catechumen (those to be baptized) are led through the steps of the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults:
- *Period Of Evangelization and Precatechumenate*: This is a time, of no fixed duration or structure, for inquiry and introduction to Gospel values, an opportunity for the beginnings of faith.
- *First Step: Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens*: This is the liturgical rite, usually celebrated on some annual date or dates, marking the beginning of the catechumenate proper, as the candidates express, and the Church accepts, their intention to respond to God's call to follow the way of Christ. (This may take place at the beginning of Advent.)
- *Period of the Catechumenate*: This is the time, in duration corresponding to the progress of the individual, for the nurturing and growth of the catechumens' faith and conversion to God; celebrations of the word and prayers of exorcism and blessing are meant to assist the process.
- **Second Step: Election or Enrollment of Names**: This is the liturgical rite, usually celebrated on the First Sunday of Lent (with the Bishop at the Cathedral in Lincoln), by which the Church formally ratifies the catechumens' readiness for the sacraments of initiation and the catechumens, now the elect, express the will to receive these sacraments.
- *Period Of Purification and Enlightenment*: This is the time immediately preceding the elects' initiation, usually the Lenten season preceding the celebration of this initiation at the Easter Vigil; it is a time of reflection, intensely centered on conversion, marked by celebration of the scrutinies and presentations and of the preparation rites on Holy Saturday.
- *Third Step: Celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation*: This is the liturgical rite, usually integrated into the Easter Vigil, by which the elect are initiated through baptism, confirmation, and the eucharist.
- *Period Of Postbaptismal Catechesis or Mystagogy*: This is the time, usually the Easter season, following the celebration of initiation, during which the newly initiated experience being fully a part of the Christian community by means of pertinent catechesis and particularly by participation with all the faithful in the Sunday eucharistic celebration.

Candidates (those already baptized) are invited to be led through a simplified process of reception into the Church.

- 4. We will expect you to attend every class unless, of course, illness or some other unavoidable circumstance prevents your attendance. Classes missed can be made up on an individual basis with Father Hazuka.
- 5. Feel free to ask questions and use the weekly "question box". This is the best way to learn. If we don't have the answers immediately, we know where we can find them!
- 6. There are some prayers which we encourage you to gradually memorize. You will find them in Appendix A of *Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church*. Among them are the Sign of the Cross, the Lord's Prayer, the Hail Mary, Glory to the Father, the Apostles' Creed, Act of Contrition, and Grace before and after Meals.
